Eagle Scout Project Information

Michael's Woodshop is available for use by Scouts working on their Eagle Scout Projects (and Summit Award or Quartermaster Projects). It is a great venue for working on any woodworking or carpentry project (benches, bird/bat houses, kiosks, etc.). We have the tools, workspace and experienced volunteers to support small or large projects.

To reserve Michael's Woodshop, youth should complete the "[Request a Date Form](#)" (6+ weeks advance notice recommended). There is a \$35/day flat fee for Eagle Scout Projects.

Scout Responsibilities:

- Provide final/approved construction drawings
- Provide all materials, fasteners & hardware needed (see our [material selection helpful hints](#))
- Schedule, organize and lead their volunteers (adult volunteers needed for cutting operations)
- Ensure adequate adult supervision throughout the day, including two-deep leadership and a registered female adult leader if required. (shop volunteers can serve as a second registered leader when necessary).

Shop Expectations:

- Scout & their volunteers will deliver materials at the beginning of the work day*
- Scout will ensure volunteers exhibit safe and responsible behavior at all times
- At the end of the scheduled work time:
 - completed project(s) and excess materials will be removed from the shop*
 - all tools and equipment will be stored properly
 - the workbenches and floor will be cleaned and swept

*Short term storage of materials or completed projects should be coordinated in advance.

Michael's Woodshop provides:

- Advance review of the construction plans/drawings for shop planning purposes
- Work space, tools and general shop supplies to support the project
- If requested, feedback, suggestions and a shop tour to aid in Scout planning
- Safety briefing, first aid kit, safety glasses and hearing protection
- An experienced volunteer to provide supervision, guidance, instruction and assistance

The volunteers in Michael's Woodshop will generally not serve as a project advisor or project coach. However, many shop volunteers have Troop or District positions where they support Eagle Scout Projects and they can serve as an advisor, coach or in other key roles via those positions.
